Lectionary Summary:

Septuagesima

Exodus 17:1–7 1 Corinthians 9:24—10:5 Matthew 20:1–16

Grace Alone

The people of Israel contended with the Lord in the wilderness (Ex. 17:1–7). They were dissatisfied with His provision. In the same way, the first laborers in the vineyard complained against the landowner for the wage he provided them (Matt. 20:1–16). They charged him with being unfair, but in reality he was being generous. For the Lord does not wish to deal with us on the basis of what we deserve but on the basis of His abounding grace in Christ. The first—those who rely on their own merits—will be last. "For they were overthrown in the wilderness" (1 Cor. 10:5). But the last, those who rely on Christ, will be first. For Christ is the Rock (1 Cor. 9:24–10:5). He is the One who was struck and from whose side blood and water flowed that we may be cleansed of our sin.

Important Dates in the Church:

February 16 Philipp Melanchthon (birth), Confessor

Philipp Melanchthon (1497–1560) was a brilliant student of the classics and a humanist scholar. In 1518, he was appointed to teach along with Martin Luther at the University of Wittenberg. At Luther's urging, Melanchthon began teaching theology and Scripture in addition to his courses in classical studies. In April 1530, Emperor Charles V called an official meeting between the representatives

of Lutheranism and Roman Catholicism, hoping to effect a meeting of minds between two opposing groups. Since Luther was at that time under papal excommunication and an imperial ban, Melanchthon was assigned the duty of being the chief Lutheran representative at this meeting. He is especially remembered and honored as the author of the Augsburg Confession, which was officially presented to the emperor on June 25, 1530, as the defining document of Lutheranism within Christendom. Melanchthon died on April 19, 1560.*

February 18 Martin Luther, Doctor and Confessor

Martin Luther, born on November 10, 1483, in Eisleben, Germany, initially began studies leading toward a degree in law. However, after a close encounter with death, he switched to the study of theology, entered an Augustinian monastery, was ordained a priest in 1505, and received a doctorate in theology in 1512. As a professor at the University of Wittenberg, Luther's scriptural studies led him to question many of the Church's teachings and practices, especially the selling of indulgences. His refusal to back down from his convictions resulted in his excommunication in 1521. Following a period of seclusion at the Wartburg castle, Luther returned to Wittenberg, where he spent the rest of his life preaching and teaching, translating the Scriptures, and writing hymns and numerous theological treatises. He is remembered and honored for his lifelong emphasis on the biblical truth that for Christ's sake God declares us righteous by grace through faith alone. Luther died on February 18, 1546, while visiting the town of his birth.*

A Note from Pastor:

Lutheran Hymnody

"Why would you pick such a long hymn?!" It might be tempting to simply look at the length of a hymn and judge it automatically as too long or too much of a burden. Indeed, ten stanzas is longer than many hymns that we are used to singing, but I encourage you to look into the deep riches of our Hymn of the Day for this Sunday.

Why would I pick such a long Hymn? The fact is, I didn't pick it. The Hymn of the Day is an appointed "proper"—the same as the Introit, the Collect of the Day, and the Scripture readings. These propers all follow the Historic Lectionary that has developed organically throughout Church History and has been handed down to us. The propers work together to weave together a theme from Scripture for our benefit

on every given Sunday. These propers unite us with our brothers and sisters in Christ from other congregations who also follow the lectionary.

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod has two options for lectionaries to follow—a three-year and a one-year cycle of readings. Regardless of which lectionary is followed, *Salvation unto Us Has Come* is included as the Hymn of the Day at some point. In addition to its use on Septuagesima Sunday, it's also an option as the Hymn of the Day on Reformation Day. While it's safe to say that the majority of congregations would view *A Mighty Fortress* as the more Lutheran option for Reformation Day, an argument could be made that *Salvation unto Us Has Come* might claim the title of "most Lutheran hymn" because of its focus on the most important teaching of the Reformation—the doctrine of Justification.

Another reason for its Lutheran significance is that *Salvation unto Us Has Come* was included in *Achtliederbuch*—the very first Lutheran hymnal which recently celebrated its 500th anniversary. This is even more impressive once you translate the German and find that this hymnal was known as the "eight-hymn book." That's right, just eight hymns in the whole hymnal, and this was one of them!

Stanza one summarizes the chief doctrine of the Church—Justification—using language from Ephesians 2 and Romans 3. Stanzas 2–4 preach the Law while stanzas 5–7 proclaim the Gospel. Stanza 8 reinforces the interplay of Law and Gospel, pointing to the cross of Christ as the peace and comfort that no part of the Law can bring. Stanza 9 steps forward from Justification to Sanctification as it shows how being justified by faith leads to love and good works, though making it clear that these good works contribute nothing to our salvation. Finally, stanza 10 praises the triune God in whom our salvation is certain.

Salvation unto Us Has Come is one of the most important hymns for us to maintain in our tradition. It is Lutheran hymnody at its finest. It expresses the teachings of the Word of God elegantly and places these words of comfort on our lips. If you can't sing all ten stanzas, take a rest for a stanza and listen to your brothers and sister in Christ proclaim the truth of Scripture to you. If you feel as though you can't sing well enough, remember that the Psalm tells us to "Make a joyful noise unto the Lord" (Psalm 100), not a perfect noise. Don't let a few extra minutes of singing mislead you into despising the Word of God that is presented so faithfully in this hymn. Rejoice in the riches of the Church handed down in poetry and music. Soli Deo Gloria—to God alone be the glory!

What is the "Office of the Keys"?

When you hear this question, you might think that there is an office somewhere in the church building that holds a lot of keys. But this use



of "office" means duty and obligation. For example, when someone is elected to Congress, they are elected to a public office with authority and certain duties. The Office of the Keys is an authority given by Christ to His Church with the duty to forgive repentant sinners, but to withhold forgiveness from the unrepentant as long as they do not repent.

Why is this authority called "keys"?

This authority given to the Church works just like a set of keys that locks and unlocks the gates of heaven. When forgiveness is withheld, the door of heaven is locked. When forgiveness is given, the door of heaven is opened and God's forgiveness in Christ is poured out on the repentant person!



Parents: Trying to understand why the Church would withhold forgiveness may be difficult. Be sure to study John 20:22–23 and Matt. 18:18 with your child. Discuss what it means to be unrepentant as opposed to repentant. An unrepentant person is not sorry for their sins and does not believe in Jesus Christ. A repentant person is sorry for their sins out of love for God and believes in Jesus Christ for salvation!


